Greene County- Historical Homes

- Tour the many historic homes in Greene County
 1. Alexander-Webb-Wilson House
This house, originally a stagecoach inn, was built in old Erie and moved to Eutaw by Dr. Abram F. Alexander who gave it to his daughter and her husband in 1848. (Drive by only)
 2. Asa White House
The Asa White house, also known as the White-McGiffert-Colson house, is a historic home in Eutaw, AL. It was built circa 1838 by Colonel Asa White, one of Greene County's earliest settlers. Eutaw was established on property owned by Asa White. He conveyed 20 acres to the newly established county seat in 1838 for the building of a courthouse, civic buildings, and a commercial district.  3. Beckham Dye Palmer House
This house was built in stages between 1899 and 1909. As the Palmer family grew, so did the house – three kitchens were built for family usage. This was the first house reportedly in Greene County to have electricity. (Drive by only)
 4. Captain Nathan Carpenter House
This house, also known as Everhope, is a classic Greek revival plantation home that was built circa 1852 for Captain Nathan Carpenter. This antebellum home was once part of a 667-acre cotton plantation. The design and construction of the house is attributed to David Rinehart Anthony who built several plantation homes in the area. Anthony's own home, built later in Eutaw, bears a strong resemblance to the Carpenter house, most notably the octagonal columns and side-gables.
 5. Dew Abrams House
Duncan Dew was a well-known planter and business man of Eutaw, AL. He came to Eutaw in 1822 and built this house about 1832. (Drive by only)

- Bird's Farm at Forkland, AL

Bird's Farm is a large field beside Highway 43 that contains many amusing and imaginative creations, most of which were made with large bales of hay. The hay bale creations include a ship on rough seas, a rabbit, a helicopter, an army tank, a matador in trouble with a bull, three monkeys that represent "hear no evil", "see no evil" and "speak no evil", an octopus devouring a seaman, a pink muscle car, and several other amusing creations. Bird's Farm also has several creations that contain no hay bales. These include Snoopy crashing the Red Baron's airplane into a tree, and a towering 32-foot Tin Man that was made with bathtubs, 55-gallon drums, an old fuel tank, a rusted out fertilizer spreader and other scrapped materials. Bird's Farm is located approximately 8 miles north of Demopolis, AL on the west side of Highway 43.
